Seattle Aquarium - Youth Ocean Advocates

Youth Ocean Advocates at the Seattle Aquarium volunteer in support of our mission, *inspiring conservation of our marine environment*. After an initial training on marine science, conservation and communication skills, youth volunteers have the opportunity to serve as interpreters in Aquarium exhibits, creators of social media content, and conservationists in the field, among other opportunities. The minimum time commitment for youth volunteers is approximately 100 hours, with at least two volunteer shifts available each weekend day during the school year. Our program aims to give students a broad view of marine science and conservation while positioning volunteers as advocates for the ocean at the Aquarium and in the community. Youth volunteers interact with a supportive cohort of over 150 peer youth volunteers.

Applicants must be enrolled in a high school, home school, or running start program and be in grades 9-12 at the time of the application. Our most successful volunteers come with an interest in the ocean, animals and/or conservation. We're looking for students who will work hard on behalf of our mission, but will also benefit from participation in the program. There is no cost to join the volunteer program and we provide bus and ferry passes to those that express need for transportation support.

At orientation potential volunteers will receive an in-depth view of our volunteer program and will have the opportunity to speak with current Youth Ocean Advocates. Each attendee will sign in with their email so that they can receive the electronic application materials following the orientation. Acceptance to the program is competitive and based upon the applicant's interest in marine science, an essay, interview and recommendation score. We anticipate approximately 60 openings for this school year's program.
